

3,000 Canadian police officers have been part of more than 53 missions around the globe, supporting the Government of Canada's commitment to global peace and security.

Foreign Policy and International Assistance.

Canadian international policing efforts are an essential element of Canada's goal to build a more secure world by working to stabilize fragile and conflict-affected states such as Haiti, Afghanistan and Sudan.

Benefits to Domestic Policing.

Twenty-six municipal and provincial police agencies from across Canada make up approximately 70 % of all Canadian deployments, with the RCMP comprising the other 30 %.

The Canadian Police Arrangement (CPA).

The Canadian Police Arrangement (CPA) is the framework through which Canadian police are deployed to international police peacekeeping and peace operations (IPP) around the world.

German experience with UN peace operations began after reunification in 1989 with the deployment of non-combat troops in Cambodia and Namibia.

Since 2001, this country has been actively engaged in NATO and EU missions in the Balkans, Afghanistan and, to a lesser extent, Africa. While Germany's contribution to KFOR is still ongoing, it has gradually reduced its contingent from 5,300 in 2001 to 903 in November 2016.

Germany joined the UN Standby Arrangement System in July 1998 and signed an additional agreement in November 2000.

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THE ROLE OF THE UN POLICE IN PEACEKEEPING

All times people believe that peace is important in order to avoid unnecessary conflicts that might hinder progress or even result in the loss of life. There are many organizations devoted to fostering peace within the domestic and global spheres.

The United Nations has been deploying police officers for service in peace operations since the 1960s. Traditionally, the mandate of police components in peace operations was limited to monitoring, observing and reporting. Beginning in the early 1990s, advisory, mentoring and training functions were integrated into the monitoring activities in order to offer

peace operations the opportunity to act as a corrective mechanism with domestic police and other law enforcement agencies.

United Nations Police are an important tool used by the Organization to help promote peace and security. Every day United Nations Policemen and Policewomen reinforce and re-establish security by patrolling, working closely with and advising domestic police services, helping to ensure compliance with international human rights standards and assisting in a wide range of activities to restore and promote public safety and the rule of law.

United Nations Police are deployed in most peacekeeping operations and are deployed as advisors in a number of United Nations Special Political Missions. United Nations Police aim to reinforce or re-establish domestic police services to create the conditions for sustainable peace and development. In a number of countries United Nations Police help host-state police and other law enforcement agents to address serious and organized crime.

Therefore, the UN Police is an important element in the implementation of peacekeeping. This is an integral part of the United Nations peace operations. UN Peacekeepers provide security and the political and peace building support to help countries make the difficult, early transition from conflict to peace.

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UN MULTIDIMENSIONAL INTEGRATED STABILIZATION MISSION IN MALI

In recent years, Mali has been confronted by a profound crisis with serious political, security, socio-economic, humanitarian and human rights consequences.

The United Nations Multidimensional Integrated Stabilization Mission in Mali (MINUSMA) was established in 2013 to support political processes in that country and carry out a number of security-related tasks. The purpose of the Mission was to support the transitional authorities of Mali in the stabilization of the country and implementation of the transitional roadmap. According to the mandate of the Mission, it was tasked to ensure the process of stabilization and protection of civilians, to support national political dialogue and reconciliation and to provide the promotion of human rights in that country.
