COMBATING AND PREVENTING CRIME IN SOCIETY (FOREIGN EXPERIENCE)

Current international crime prevention practices show that the most progressive and effective approaches to combating crime and its individual manifestations take place mainly in developed oil and oil-rich western countries. Many factors influence the formation of highly trained police forces capable of counteracting and preventing crime, such as: government funding, scientific development, and implementation of a long-term public impact strategy through the design and implementation of various prevention programs and projects.

Police in the United Arab Emirates started testing robots. The first such officer began to perform his duties in Dubai. This is only the first step in a large-scale patrol automation program. The Dubai Police Department, the largest city in the United Arab Emirates, has launched an experiment involving the first robots. If the law enforcement officer well established in the service, by 2030, work scheduled to replace a quarter of patrols and the city.

Cyborg has armor that completely replicates the shape of a Dubai police officer. He is the size of an adult man. Robocop even gives a military salute as a real police officer. These jobs can work 24 hours a day and seven days a week. An important element is that he does not have to pay a salary. In the emirate of Dubai, police are accustomed to dealing with high technology and luxury equipment. Here patrols leave on high-tech super trucks Lamborghini and Ferrari. However, the first robot cop in the Middle East raises the bar of manufacturability even higher. Cyborg does not need a car because it has

wheels instead of legs. It also comes with cameras and a face recognition system.

In addition, that is not all he can do, cyborgs can read machine numbers, compare faces with those in the police database, and send results to headquarters. A live video broadcast from his cameras recognizes the bags left behind in popular Dubai locations. From now on, people in Dubai will be able to report a crime or offense with words or by tapping on a tag that placed on his chest.

Therefore, we can conclude that the competent management and funding of law enforcement plays a very large role, a notable example of the United Arab Emirates, which has invented a new way of detecting and combating crime, which greatly speeds up police work.

ACTIONS TO TACKLE DOMESTIC ABUSE

Domestic abuse comes in many forms, shattering the lives of victims and their families, and in recognition of this it is widely important to put forward proposals for new laws which would transform our approach to this terrible crime. Domestic abuse is a crime that comes in different forms – physical, emotional or economic and takes many modes - from physical and sexual abuse, to controlling and coercive behavior that isolates victims from their families and has long-term, shattering impacts on their children. To tackle domestic abuse it's necessary to have proper legislation. To ensure getting this landmark legislation it's necessary to hear from all those who have been affected by abuse, from survivors, frontline professionals, charities and the public, to gather views on how, together, put a stop to domestic abuse at once and for all. The actions that are launching today includes a number of proposals which have the potential to completely transform the way we tackle domestic abuse, providing better protection to victims and bringing more perpetrators to justice. There are proposal for the creation of a statutory aggravating factor in sentencing for domestic abuse, similar to those already in law for hate crimes, to toughen sentences when it involves or affects a child. Economic abuse will be recognized for the first time as a type of domestic abuse, covering controlling circumstances in which victims have finances withheld, are denied access to employment, are forced to take out loans and enter into other financial contracts.
